

# The Alliance attended and participated in 15 Pride events from the Canadian border to Hudson!

As I now reflect on the events we attended and the hundreds of people we met, there are two things that stand out above all else. First – our team is amazing! They didn't just show up for our clients, they were there with smiles on their faces and compassion in their hearts.

Second – there is so much work to be done! Everywhere we went, we found people who need our help. From HIV testing to being able to find care, housing, social opportunities, and anti-stigma education, there is a true need in our communities. In response, our team is already rolling out one new educational opportunity for providers! More details follow and we'll be keeping you posted as things move along.

There was another very important day in June — National HIV Testing Day on June 27. We had testing locations open for expanded hours in Albany, Schenectady, and Glens Falls and participated in another testing event in Hudson. We are grateful to WTEN in Albany for the story they aired about our work and the need for testing. Click here to see the story.

While the HIV/AIDS epidemic always has been and will continue to be our primary focus, because of those we help, we also have the responsibility to provide wrap-around care for the entire individual. That means programs for aging with HIV, living with HIV while incarcerated, nutrition education, assistance with housing, food, insurance, transportation, and so much more.

For several years we have offered Narcan training, syringe exchange, and a Suboxone clinic from our office in Plattsburgh. Recently, this program expanded, and we are now offering services from our locations in Schenectady, Hudson, Glens Falls, and Albany. This community needs help and we're striving to meet them where they are.

The past few months have also included a very successful 20th Anniversary Dining Out For Life event on April 27. Several third-party fundraisers have also been conducted and I'm grateful for what this shows in terms of support for our programs.

As always, none of this happens without our donors, Board of Directors, team members, and volunteers. Thank you for showing up as we strive to end the HIV/AIDS epidemic.

# Know the skin you're in

Summer is upon us and we are once again reminded of the impacts infections place on our daily lives. COVID-19 and MPOX showed us how we must stay vigilant as a community during times of crisis. The Alliance For Positive Health has been focusing on providing our clients and the greater community with awareness, education, and referrals to vaccination clinics throughout Northeastern New York.

During June, we worked closely with our local county health offices to link people to preventative care and education. This included all the 15 Pride events we attended throughout Northeastern NY.

We know that those living with immune-compromising conditions, such as HIV/AIDS, pregnant women, children under 8 years old, and the MSM (men who have sex with men) community have the greatest reason to stay aware and take preventative steps to stay protected.

Together with the New York State Department of Health, we are committed to making sure everyone has access to life-saving treatment and



prevention—everyone. The NYS DOH campaign, "It Takes Two" focuses on the importance of vaccination—it's free, effective, and easy. Two doses, taken within 4 weeks. For more details on MPOX, including the nearest vaccination clinics, please visit us at bit.ly/mpoxneny.

# How long have you worked at the Alliance?

When I proposed a re-structure of the HH program that allowed for promotions from within. I was given 1 year to prove the changes and it was a success! We were able to allow care managers to gain managerial experience so that when there was a PM vacancy we could choose from the team instead of looking outside.

# **National Testing Day 2023**





June 27th was National HIV Testing Day. Here in Northeastern New York HIV still exists, a fact highlighted by the positive test results we saw during our local events. It is imperative that we make sure our community knows that testing is always free, nonjudgmental, and confidential. More importantly, we connect people to life saving and affirming care!

We provide HIV, STI, and Hepatitis-C testing at our offices in Albany and Schenectady, as well as with our mobile testing van which we take to areas where people have no other accessibility to testing and anywhere we get the opportunity to test in our communities.

The day's theme this year was "Take The Test & Take The Next Step." Our goal was to make it easier for people to know their HIV status and be linked to the care and services they need including prevention, treatment, and services. We offered greatly expanded testing availability in Albany, Schenectady, and Glens Falls. We also held a pop-up testing clinic with our friends at Hope & Healing Recovery Wellness Center in Hudson Falls, NY.

# **PRIDE** WRAP-UP

Our goal as Pride month began was to ensure that the Alliance and our programs were visible and engaged throughout the region. That meant we had to show up at events, become substantial supporters of the events, showcase two new grants that address disparities and inequalities within the LGBTQ+ community, and meet people where they are. That's exactly what we did! 15 pride events from Malone and Plattsburgh to Hudson.

We took the mobile testing van to test for HIV, STIs, and HCV and we ran MPOX clinics in areas where people may not regularly have access to services. No other agency has the ability to offer this scope of services in one stop! We engaged potential volunteers to help manage our gardens in Glens Falls and Plattsburgh. We made new connections that will result in new, meaningful services for our clients throughout our service area.

But most importantly, we showed up to listen and survey. We wanted to turn these events into opportunities to learn what challenges our clients are facing and what services we can offer to help. And we wanted to connect with other community partners. It's truly hard to quantify how much happened! Here are just a few examples:



- We all know stigma remains an issue, but it is something that we have to help address. The best thing we can do to impact care for our clients is to address the stigmas still prevalent in the medical community. We've already built the program and are rolling it out as I'm writing!
- Transportation. Time and time again we heard that finding transportation to medical appointments is an issue, especially in communities with smaller populations. One example is that there are literally zero Uber drivers in Schoharie County.
- We found three specialized therapists working in the LGBTQ+ community in the North Country that we didn't know before.
- Social Opportunities. Because of the stigmas our clients face, social opportunities where they can be together in a safe environment hold a special

- significance. We heard time and time again that this is needed and we all know how important social connections are to health and wellbeing.
- We found a new business in Plattsburgh that will be providing a regular social event for our clients.


We also heard many, many thank-you's. For offering non-judgmental, confidential, and free services. For showing up and meeting people where they are. For listening. For providing access to the care they couldn't find anywhere else.

If there were just one message I could share with you, it is that we are needed. What our clients need now looks a little different than it did 20 years ago, but HIV is still impacting them and creating real issues in other parts of their lives.



# HARM REDUCTION SERVICES

# Gabrielle Draper, Program Manager



We sat down with Gabrielle Draper, Program Manager of Harm Reduction Services to talk about the recent expansion of our Harm Reduction services into the Albany area.

# What should people know about it?

Our Harm Reduction program has expanded into the Capital Region, allowing us to provide muchneeded Harm Reduction Services in Albany, Schenectady, and Saratoga counties. This includes a fully operational Syringe Exchange Program out of our Albany office at 927 Broadway. The Syringe Exchange Program, Project Exchange, is a free and anonymous program that provides a safe option for people to obtain free, sterile needles and supplies. Walk-in hours are Mondays and Fridays 10:00 am – 4:00 pm, and Tuesday-Thursday by appointment. However, we also operate by special arrangements, which means we can deliver your supplies right to you in the community.

# How do people benefit from this expansion program?

We offer a variety of services including sterile needles and supplies, Harm Reduction counseling, HIV/HCV testing and screening, Narcan training and kits, and referrals to health care. We also provide education and training throughout the community to dismantle the stigma regarding people who use drugs. If you or someone you know is struggling with addiction, we can help you stay safe.

# Is the Capital Region the only new addition to the program?

The Capital Region expansion builds on our already existing Harm Reduction program servicing Clinton, Essex, Franklin, Warren, Hamilton, and Washington counties. We also offer a Buprenorphine bridge clinic through our Plattsburgh location, that provides telemedicine services to clients right here in the Capital Region.
